MEDICAID. Provides relative to Medicaid prior authorization during a declared emergency. (8/1/25)

1	AN ACT
2	To enact R.S. 46:460.76.3, relative to Medicaid prior authorization during a declared
3	emergency; to authorize the Louisiana Department of Health to suspend prior
4	authorization requirements for certain Medicaid recipients during a declared
5	emergency; to require payments to certain providers without prior authorization; to
6	provide for documentation; to provide for notification to Medicaid recipients; and
7	to provide for related matters.
8	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
9	Section 1. R.S. 46:460.76.3 is hereby enacted to read as follows:
10	§460.76.3. Prior authorization; suspension during state of emergency
11	A. During a state of emergency declared by the governor pursuant to the
12	Louisiana Homeland Security and Emergency Assistance and Disaster Act, R.S.
13	29:721 et seq., the Louisiana Department of Health may suspend prior
14	authorization requirements for Medicaid to ensure uninterrupted access to
15	medically necessary oncology health care, including diagnostics, treatments,
16	medications, and supportive services essential for cancer management.
17	<b>B.</b> Any Medicaid managed care organization, pharmacy benefit

1	manager, or entity responsible for fee-for-service claims processing shall
2	reimburse providers for medically necessary oncologic drugs, services,
3	equipment, supplies, and therapies provided to Medicaid recipients during the
4	emergency without requiring prior authorization. Any Medicaid managed care
5	organization, pharmacy benefit manager, or entity responsible for fee-for-
6	service claims processing shall reimburse any out-of-state provider that
7	provided essential oncologic care, including chemotherapy, radiation therapy,
8	and diagnostic imaging, to a Louisiana Medicaid recipient who evacuated out
9	of state, whether voluntarily or involuntarily, without requiring prior
10	authorization.
11	<b><u>C.</u></b> The prior authorization suspension provided for in this Section shall
12	only apply to Medicaid recipients undergoing cancer treatment who reside
13	within the designated emergency area.
14	<b>D.</b> The Medicaid managed care organizations shall notify oncologic
15	patients of prior authorization suspensions, uninterrupted care access, and
16	rights during emergencies. Notifications should be distributed through
17	healthcare providers, community outreach, and online platforms to ensure all
18	patients, especially vulnerable or displaced individuals, are aware of the
19	provisions of this Section and can make informed decisions about their care.

<u>Proposed law</u> authorizes the La. Dept. of Health to suspend prior authorization requirements for Medicaid during a declared emergency to ensure uninterrupted access to medically necessary oncology health care.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires Medicaid to reimburse providers for medically necessary oncologic drugs, services, equipment, supplies, and therapies provided to Medicaid recipients during the emergency without requiring prior authorization.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires Medicaid to reimburse any out-of-state provider that provided essential oncologic care, including chemotherapy, radiation therapy, and diagnostic imaging, to a La. Medicaid recipient who evacuated out-of-state without requiring prior authorization.

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<u>Proposed law</u> requires the Medicaid managed care organizations to notify oncologic patients of prior authorization suspensions, uninterrupted care access, and rights during emergencies.

Effective August 1, 2025.
