Present law provides for the powers and duties of the La. Emergency Medical Services Commission(commission), including making recommendations to the La. Dept. of Health, bureau of emergency medical services regarding requirements and standards of practice for licensed EMS practitioners.

Proposed law adds a requirement for the commission to include in the recommended requirements and standards of practice the authority for certain licensed EMS practitioners to administer patient-carried, time-critical prescription medication to patients with rare diseases, chronic illnesses, and special medical needs.

Proposed law authorizes EMS practitioners to administer the medication at the request of the patient or patient's family and in accordance with protocols established by the EMS practitioner's EMS medical director.

Proposed law provides that an EMS practitioner acting in accordance with the provisions of proposed law shall be immune from civil liability, criminal prosecution, or disciplinary or other adverse action under any professional licensing statute for any outcomes resulting from the administration of the medication, unless personal injury results from the gross negligence or willful or wanton misconduct of the EMS practitioner administering the medication.

Proposed law provides that proposed law shall be named and may be known as "The Danny's Dose EMS Treatment Act".

Effective August 1, 2026.

Summary of Amendments Adopted by Senate

Senate Floor Amendments to engrossed bill

1. Moves the responsibility for establishing protocols for the administration of patient-carried, time-critical prescription medication from the La. Emergency Medical Services Commission to the EMS practitioner's EMS medical director.
2. Requires the commission to include the authority for EMS practitioners to administer

the medications to certain patients in the requirements and standards of practice submitted to the bureau.
