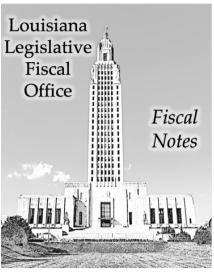

 Provides with respect to the Department of Environmental Quality fees

Proposed law provides for a new fee structure to be set by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) through promulgation of rules and regulations. To calculate these new fees the department shall use a formula developed by rules based upon the test category per fee matrix, accreditation requested, and location of the laboratory. Proposed law provides that these fees shall annually adjust based on the annual rate of the Consumer Price Index if the department determines it is necessary. DEQ shall promulgate rules to determine late fees that shall not exceed 15% of the original fee amount. Proposed law provides that 90 days after a prescribed fee's due date shall constitute a violation, and shall subject that entity to applicable enforcement. DEQ also gains jurisdiction over the regulation of groundwater protection and underground storage tanks.

**EXPENDITURE EXPLANATION**

Proposed law may nominally increase SGR expenditures out of the Environmental Trust Dedicated Fund Account. Proposed law provides for a new fee structure to be set by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) through promulgation of rules and regulations. DEQ reports that to implement the new fee structure there may be costs associated with updating computer systems in FY 27. DEQ reports that any nominal costs to update their system can be absorbed using existing staff and resources.

**REVENUE EXPLANATION**

Proposed law will increase SGR revenue deposited into the Environmental Trust Dedicated Fund Account by \$12,338,369 in FY 28, \$14,076,370 in FY 29, and \$14,241,369 in FY 30 and FY 31. Proposed law provides for a new fee structure to be set by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) through promulgation of rules and regulations. There is no increase in fees assessed in FY 27 as DEQ will be implementing the proposed law through rule making and technology system changes to assess the new fees in FY 28. These fee estimates are the maximum amount of revenue the department can generate from these fees based on the test category matrix. These estimates do not incorporate any potential increases the department may make related to the annual increases for the Consumer Price Index, or any late fees that may be charged. The department utilizes both fixed fees, the same amount for all applicants, and variable fees, differing amounts based on certain qualifications. The increase in fixed fees is calculated as the number of applicants in FY 25 multiplied by the proposed fee change. The increase in variable fees is calculated as a percentage increase of current collections. Due to the number of variable fees the department anticipates adjusting, this fiscal note provides an estimated increase across different fee categories. Page two of this fiscal note provides more details on the fixed and variable fee increases. Below is a breakdown of the total variable and fixed fees maximums for FY 28.

Total FY 28 Variable Revenue: \$11,440,649  
 Total FY 28 Fixed Fee Revenue Increase: \$942,720  
 Total FY 28 Revenue Increase: **\$12,383,369**

Starting in FY 29, the Water Fee will increase by an additional \$15,000 per fee. In FY 25, DEQ charged 36 facilities this fee, which will generate \$540,000 (\$15,000 x 36). The Solid Waste Fee will increase by an additional 10% in FY 29, generating an additional \$409,000 in revenue. The Radiation Fee will increase by 20% to \$184, generating an additional \$75,000. These increases will total an additional increase of \$1,024,000 in FY 29 SGR revenue.

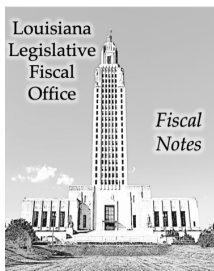

In FY 30, the Radiation Fee will increase from \$184 to a fixed rate of \$250, which will generate an additional \$165,000 annually.

Total FY 29 Increase: \$14,076,369  
 Total FY 30 Additional Increase: \$165,000  
 Total FY 30 Revenue: **\$14,241,369**

The department reports that the fees that will be calculated using the test category matrices include: Hazardous Waste Tonnage (HWT), Radiation Fees, Lab Accreditation Fees, Air, Water, Solid Waste, and Groundwater Waste Fees.

See Below for a breakdown of the increase in fees for fixed fees based on the actual number of applicants in FY 25.

Note\* The Radiation Fee Category currently charged is \$128 and will increase by 20% in FY 28 (\$154) and FY 29 (\$184) until FY 30 when it will become a fixed rate of \$250.

The fees below are variable fees and will increase based on a percentage of the actual FY 25 collections. Due to the number of variable fees the department anticipates adjusting, this fiscal note provides an estimated increase across different fee categories.
