DRUGS: Provides relative to drug paraphernalia

1 AN ACT

2 To amend and reenact R.S. 40:1021(A)(5) and 1024(C) and to enact R.S. 40:1024(D),
3 relative to drug paraphernalia; to provide for definitions; to provide for the creation
4 of a needle exchange program; to provide for the purpose and duties of the program;
5 to provide for exceptions; and to provide for related matters.

6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

7 Section 1. R.S. 40:1021(A)(5) and 1024(C) are hereby amended and reenacted and
8 R.S. 40:1024(D) is hereby enacted to read as follows:

9 §1021. Definitions

10 A. As used in this Part, unless the context clearly otherwise indicates, the
11 term "drug paraphernalia" shall mean and include, but not be limited to:

12 * * *

13 (5) Testing equipment used, intended for use, or designed for use in
14 identifying, or in analyzing the strength, effectiveness, or purity of controlled
15 substances, except for testing equipment designed for use in identifying the presence
16 of fentanyl.

18 §1024. Exceptions; defenses; local needle exchanges

1 C. ~~Any provision of law to the contrary herein notwithstanding, the~~
2 ~~provisions of this Part shall not prohibit the establishment and implementation of a~~
3 ~~needle exchange program within the jurisdiction of a local governing authority,~~
4 ~~including but not limited to a city, town, or parish, upon the express approval of the~~
5 ~~local governing authority.~~ Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, any
6 governmental or nongovernmental entity, including a local or district health
7 department or an organization that promotes scientifically proven ways of mitigating
8 health risk associated with drug use and other high-risk behaviors, may establish and
9 implement a needle exchange program. The objective of the program shall include
10 the following:

11 (1) Reduce the spread of HIV, AIDS, viral hepatitis, and other bloodborne

15 D. Programs established pursuant to this Section may offer all of the

Abstract: Creates a drug paraphernalia needle exchange program.

Present law prohibits any person or corporation from knowingly, or under circumstances where one reasonably should know, selling, lending, renting, leasing, giving, exchanging, or otherwise distributing to any person any drug paraphernalia as that term is defined by present law.

Proposed law excludes fentanyl testing equipment as "drug paraphernalia".

Proposed law authorizes any governmental or nongovernmental entity to establish and implement a needle exchange program for the purpose of reducing the spread of HIV, AIDS, viral hepatitis, and other bloodborne diseases in the state and reducing needle stick injuries to law enforcement officers and other emergency personnel.

Programs established pursuant to proposed law may offer all of the following:

- (1) Disposal of used needles and hypodermic syringes.
- (2) Needles, hypodermic syringes, and other drug use supplies in quantities sufficient to ensure that needles, hypodermic syringes, and other drug use supplies are not shared or reused.
- (3) Educational materials on overdose prevention; the prevention of HIV, AIDS, and viral hepatitis transmission; drug abuse prevention; treatment for mental illness, including treatment referrals; and treatment for substance abuse, including referrals for medication assisted treatment.
- (4) Access to naloxone kits that contain naloxone hydrochloride that is approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration for the treatment of a drug overdose. Supplies and materials distributed by a program pursuant to this Section shall be distributed at no cost.

Summary of Amendments Adopted by House

The House Floor Amendments to the engrossed bill:

1. Remove the provision of proposed law which provided that no employee, volunteer, or participant of the program shall be arrested, charged with, or prosecuted for possession of needles, hypodermic syringes, or other drug use supplies obtained from or returned to the program or for the possession of residual amounts of a controlled substance contained in used drug use supplies obtained from or returned to a program.
2. Make a technical change.
