2	To amend and reenact Civil Code Art. 2696 and R.S. 9:3260, relative to leases; to provide
3	for obligations of the lessor; to provide for premises to be leased; to provide for
4	lessee's rights; and to provide for related matters.
5	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
6	Section 1. Civil Code Art. 2696 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
7	Art. 2696. Warranty against vices or defects
8	The lessor warrants the lessee that the thing is suitable for the purpose for
9	which it was leased and that it is free of vices or defects that prevent its use for that
10	purpose. The purpose of a lease of a dwelling or residential property is presumed
11	to be for habitation.
12	This warranty also extends to vices or defects that arise after the delivery of
13	the thing and are not attributable to the fault of the lessee.
14	Section 2. R.S. 9:3260 is hereby amended and reenacted to read as follows:
15	§3260. Premises rendered uninhabitable; mitigation of damages
16	When a lessee or tenant of commercial, residential, or dwelling premises has
17	been constructively evicted from the premises, and when the premises are rendered

required to **reasonably** mitigate his damages.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides there is presumption that the purpose of a lease of a dwelling or residential property is for habitation.

<u>Present law</u> requires a landlord or lessor to mitigate his damages to constructively evict a tenant. <u>Proposed law</u> requires the mitigation be reasonable.
