**CRIME/MISDEMEANOR:** Creates the crime of discrimination based on vaccination status.

### DIGEST

<u>Proposed law</u> prohibits banning entry onto the premises of a governmental entity or public educational institution based on COVID-19 vaccination status.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that a government entity or public educational institution found to be in violation of <u>proposed law</u> will be liable for damages, including reasonable court costs and attorneys fees.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides an exemption for healthcare providers enrolled in Medicare or Medicaid who are subject to fines or penalties for noncompliance with federal rules and regulations.

Effective August 1, 2022.

### Summary of Amendments Adopted by House

- The Committee Amendments Proposed by <u>House Committee on Administration of</u> <u>Criminal Justice</u> to the <u>original</u> bill:
- 1. Make technical changes.
- 2. Remove the penalty of imprisonment.
- 3. Provide for enforcement by a summons in lieu of arrest.
- 4. Prohibit only governmental entities or educational institutions from requiring proof of a COVID-19 vaccination for anyone seeking admission on the premises of the entity or institution.
- 5. Establish an exemption for healthcare providers enrolled in Medicare or Medicaid who are subject to fines or penalties for noncompliance with federal rules and regulations.

# The House Floor Amendments to the engrossed bill:

1. Prohibit an employer of a governmental entity or educational institution from discharging or discriminating against any employee based on his refusal to adhere to a vaccine requirement.

# Summary of Amendments Adopted by Senate

Committee Amendments Proposed by Senate Committee on Judiciary C to the reengrossed bill

- 1. Change criminal offense to civil action.
- 2. Exclude private educational institutions.

- 3. Include liability of government entity or public educational institution for damages, reasonable court costs, and attorneys fees.
- 4. Make technical changes.
