<u>Prior law</u> created a program to authorize certification of medication attendants to perform certain functions in licensed nursing homes. <u>New law</u> extends the medication attendant program created in <u>prior law</u> to include both licensed nursing homes and licensed adult residential care providers.

<u>New law</u> defines "licensed long-term care facility" to encompass both nursing homes and adult residential care providers.

<u>Prior law</u> provided that persons who have completed an approved medication administration course, passed a qualifying certification examination, and been issued a current certification by the department shall be permitted to administer certain prescribed medications to residents of licensed nursing homes. <u>New law</u> changes <u>prior law</u> to allow such persons to administer certain prescribed medications to residents of licensed nursing homes and of licensed adult residential care providers.

<u>Prior law</u> provided that the rules and regulations shall include but not be limited to ratios of supervising licensed nurses to medication attendants in licensed nursing homes. <u>New law</u> changes <u>prior law</u> and states that the rules and regulations shall include but not be limited to ratios of supervising licensed nurses to medication attendants in licensed long-term care facilities.

<u>Prior law</u> required the promulgation of rules and regulations for the enforcement of <u>prior law</u> to be done by March 31, 2008. <u>New law</u> removes the deadline for the promulgation of rules and regulations.

<u>Prior law</u> required each person accepted to participate in the medication administration course to have a minimum of one year's experience in a nursing home as a certified nursing assistant or graduated from a nursing program. <u>New law</u> requires each person accepted to participate in the medication administration course to have a minimum of one year's experience in a licensed long-term care facility as a certified nursing assistant or graduate from a nursing program.

<u>Prior law</u> required any nursing home utilizing a medication attendant to verify with the nurse aide registry that the person has a current certification. <u>New law</u> changes <u>prior law</u> and requires any licensed long-term care facility utilizing a medication attendant to verify with the nurse aide registry that the person has a current certification.
