CONSTITUTION/AMENDMENT: (Constitutional Amendment) Prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude

1	A JOINT RESOLUTION
2	To amend Article I, Section 3 of the Constitution of Louisiana, relative to the prohibition of
3	slavery and involuntary servitude; to provide for an exception; to provide for
4	submission of the proposed amendment to the electors; and to provide for related
5	matters.
6	Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of Louisiana, two-thirds of the members
7	elected to each house concurring, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state of
8	Louisiana, for their approval or rejection in the manner provided by law, a proposal to
9	amend Article I, Section 3 of the Constitution of Louisiana, to read as follows:
10	§3. Right to Individual Dignity
11	Section 3. No person shall be denied the equal protection of the laws. No
12	law shall discriminate against a person because of race or religious ideas, beliefs, or
13	affiliations. No law shall arbitrarily, capriciously, or unreasonably discriminate
14	against a person because of birth, age, sex, culture, physical condition, or political
15	ideas or affiliations. Slavery and involuntary servitude are forever prohibited, except
16	in the latter case as punishment for crime. The prohibition of involuntary servitude
17	shall not prohibit an inmate from being required to work when the inmate has been
18	duly convicted of a crime.
19	Section 2. Be it further resolved that this proposed amendment shall be submitted
20	to the electors of the state of Louisiana at the statewide election to be held on October 14,
21	2023.

2	there shall be printed a proposition, upon which the electors of the state shall be permitted

5	Do you support an amendment to prohibit involuntary servitude while not	
6	prohibiting an inmate from being required to work when the inmate has been	
7	duly convicted of a crime? (Amends Article 1, Section 3)

Abstract: Prohibits the use of slavery and involuntary servitude but provides that the prohibition of involuntary servitude shall not prohibit work requirements for duly convicted inmates.

<u>Present constitution</u> provides that slavery and involuntary servitude are prohibited, except in the case of involuntary servitude as punishment for a crime.

<u>Proposed constitutional amendment</u> provides that slavery and involuntary servitude are forever prohibited.

<u>Proposed constitutional amendment</u> removes the exception allowing for the use of involuntary servitude as punishment for a crime.

<u>Proposed constitutional amendment</u> provides that the prohibition of involuntary servitude shall not prohibit an inmate from being required to work when the inmate has been duly convicted of a crime.

Provides for submission of the proposed amendment to the voters at the statewide election to be held Oct. 14, 2023.
