Keyword and summary of the bill as proposed by the Conference Committee

CRIME/PUNISHMENT. Increases the penalty for human trafficking involving sexual activity of persons under the age of eighteen. (8/1/24)

Report rejects House amendments which would have:

1. Provided an affirmative defense to prosecution for <u>any</u> crime, rather than certain <u>present law</u> crimes, committed by a victim of human trafficking when the trafficking included commercial sexual activity and the crime committed was a direct result of being trafficked.

Digest of the bill as proposed by the Conference Committee

<u>Present law</u> provides that human trafficking is when any person knowingly recruits, harbors, transports, provides, solicits, receives, isolates, entices, obtains, patronizes, procures, purchases, holds, restrains, induces, threatens, subjects, or maintains the use of another person through fraud, force, or coercion to provide services or labor.

<u>Present law</u> further provides that human trafficking is when any person knowingly recruits, harbors, transports, provides, solicits, sells, purchases, patronizes, procures, holds, restrains, induces, threatens, subjects, receives, isolates, entices, obtains, or maintains the use of a person under the age of 21 years for the purpose of engaging in commercial sexual activity regardless of whether the person was recruited, harbored, transported, provided, solicited, sold, purchased, received, isolated, enticed, obtained, or maintained through fraud, force, or coercion.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that to knowingly sell the use of another person through fraud, force, or coercion to provide services or labor of someone for a purpose other than engaging in commercial sexual activity is human trafficking.

Proposed law otherwise retains present law.

<u>Present law</u> provides graduated penalties based on the age of the victim and whether the victim was trafficked for commercial sexual activity.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides an increase in the penalty for trafficking persons under the age of 18 for commercial sexual activity <u>from</u> a fine not to exceed \$50,000, imprisonment at hard labor for not less than 15 years, nor more than 50 years, or both <u>to</u> a fine not to exceed \$75,000 and life imprisonment at hard labor without the possibility of probation or parole.

<u>Proposed law</u> otherwise retains <u>present law</u>.

Effective August 1, 2024.

(Amends R.S. 14:46.2(A)(1)(a), (B)(2), and (F)(1) and 46.3(D))
