HEALTH CARE: Provides relative to telemedicine

1	AN ACT
2	To amend and reenact R.S. 37:1262(4) and 1276.1(B)(2)(a) and to enact R.S. 37:1271(B)(3),
3	relative to telemedicine; to amend the definition of telemedicine to include the use
4	of asynchronous store-and-forward technology for certain consultations; to exempt
5	certain consultations from requiring the presence of a licensed Louisiana health care
6	professional; to require an appropriate examination of a patient; and to provide for
7	related matters.
8	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
9	Section 1. R.S. 37:1262(4) and 1276.1(B)(2)(a) are hereby amended and reenacted
10	and R.S. 37:1271(B)(3) is hereby enacted to read as follows:
11	§1262. Definition
12	As used in this Part the following words and phrases shall have the meanings
13	ascribed to them:

15	(4) "Telemedicine" means the practice of health care delivery, diagnosis,
16	consultation, treatment, and transfer of medical data using interactive
17	telecommunication technology that enables a health care practitioner and a patient
18	at two locations separated by distance to interact via two-way video and audio
19	transmissions simultaneously. <u>Telemedicine shall also include the use of</u>
20	asynchronous store-and-forward technology by a health care practitioner, located at
21	a site other than the site where the patient is located, to provide a consultation
22	relating to the health care diagnosis or treatment of the patient. Neither a telephone

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1	conversation nor an electronic mail message between a health care practitioner and
2	patient, or a true consultation an informal consultation or second opinion as may be
3	defined by rules promulgated by the board pursuant to the Administrative Procedure
4	Act, constitutes telemedicine for the purposes of this Part.

18	B. The board shall establish by rule in accordance with the Administrative
19	Procedure Act the requirements for licensure under this Section provided the rules
20	include the following:

22	(2) The physician, when examining a patient by telemedicine, shall establish
23	a bona fide physician-patient relationship by:
24	(a) Conducting an appropriate examination of the patient as determined by
25	the board. An examination conducted pursuant to this Paragraph for the purposes of
26	providing a consultation relating to the health care diagnosis or treatment of a patient
27	shall not require that the physician or other health care professional be present with
28	the patient but may include but not be limited to review of any relevant history,

examination by electronic means using a secure video line, laboratory or diagnostic studies, review of diagnoses, or other information deemed pertinent by the physician.

Abstract: Expands the definition of telemedicine to include the use of asynchronous storeand-forward technology by a health care practitioner, located at a site other than the site where the patient is located, to provide a consultation relating to the health care diagnosis or treatment of the patient.

<u>Present law</u> defines "telemedicine" as the practice of health care delivery, diagnosis, consultation, treatment, and transfer of medical data using interactive telecommunication technology that enables a health care practitioner and a patient at two locations separated by distance to interact via two-way video and audio transmissions simultaneously.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> and expands the definition of "telemedicine" to include the use of asynchronous store-and-forward technology by a health care practitioner, located at a site other than the site where the patient is located, to provide a consultation relating to the health care diagnosis or treatment of the patient.

<u>Present law</u> provides that neither a telephone conversation nor an electronic mail message between a health care practitioner and patient, or a true consultation constitutes telemedicine.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> but clarifies the phrase "true consultation" by changing it to "informal consultation or second opinion".

<u>Present law</u> requires any person authorized by the La. State Board of Medical Examiners to practice telemedicine to ensure that a La. licensed health care professional who can adequately and accurately assist is in the examination room with the patient at the time the patient is receiving telemedicine services.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> but adds an exemption for the practice of telemedicine by a health care practitioner, located at a site other than the site where the patient is located, using asynchronous store-and-forward technology to provide a consultation relating to the health care diagnosis or treatment of a patient.

<u>Present law</u> requires a physician, when examining a patient by telemedicine, to establish a bona fide physician-patient relationship by conducting an appropriate examination of the patient as determined by the board.

<u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> but further provides that an examination conducted for the purposes of providing a consultation relating to the health care diagnosis or treatment of a patient shall not require that the physician or other health care professional be present with the patient but may include but not be limited to review of any relevant history, examination by electronic means using a secure video line, laboratory or diagnostic studies, review of diagnoses, or other information deemed pertinent by the physician.
