HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 61

EDUCATION/FINANCE: Urges and requests BESE to develop a statewide funding model for early childhood care and educational services

1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION
2	To urge and request the State Board of Elementary Education, in consultation with
3	stakeholders, to develop and recommend a statewide funding model for the funding
4	and equitable distribution of public funds to support early childhood care and
5	education no later than sixty days prior to the convening of the 2015 Regular Session
6	of the Legislature.
7	WHEREAS, the legislature passed Act No. 3 of the 2012 Regular Session, which
8	directed the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education to create a comprehensive
9	and integrated network through which to manage and oversee all programs funded through
10	state or federal resources that provide early childhood care or educational services; and
11	WHEREAS, through the enactment of Act No. 3 of the 2012 Regular Session of the
12	Legislature, the legislature found and declared that:
13	(1) In order to significantly improve outcomes at all levels of the state's educational
14	system, it is imperative that standards for, and expectations of, our early childhood programs
15	be raised to levels that will promote kindergarten readiness and sustain lifelong learning and
16	achievement.
17	(2) Publicly-funded early childhood programs should prioritize kindergarten
18	readiness and public monies should fund programs that excel at achieving high levels of
19	kindergarten readiness, or progression towards kindergarten readiness, as applicable for the
20	ages of children served.

(3) Parents who choose to send their children to publicly-funded early childhood 2 programs should have clear and actionable information on the quality of the programs 3 available.

4 Providers of publicly-funded early childhood programs should be held (4) 5 accountable for the public monies they receive, but given the autonomy to implement an 6 educational program that promotes and achieves kindergarten readiness without undue 7 regulation.

8 (5) State entities involved in the oversight or provision of early childhood programs 9 should collaborate, set standards of educational achievement for young children that align 10 with standards established for children enrolled in grades kindergarten through twelve, and 11 hold providers of publicly-funded early childhood programs accountable without imposing 12 undue regulation on said programs.

13 (6) There are high-quality early childhood programs in this state that can serve as 14 a model for increasing standards of achievement and financial efficiency in publicly-funded 15 early childhood programs.

16 (7) Publicly-funded early childhood programs receive a significant amount of public 17 monies that can and should be maximized in pursuit of high-quality early childhood 18 programs that achieve high levels of kindergarten readiness or progression towards 19 kindergarten readiness, as applicable for the ages of children served.

20 (8) Tax incentives created for the purpose of promoting high-quality early childhood 21 programs should be awarded based on kindergarten readiness, or progression towards 22 kindergarten readiness, as applicable for the ages of children served.

23 (9) A fragmented system of standards, funding, and oversight of the state's publicly-24 funded early childhood programs serves as a barrier to providing every child with the high-25 quality services and programs which he deserves and to providing parents with the 26 information needed to make an informed choice when selecting the programs that best fit 27 the needs of their children.

28 WHEREAS, the legislature expressed its intent that "a comprehensive and integrated 29 delivery system for early childhood care and education be created to ensure that every child 30 enters kindergarten healthy and ready to learn"; and

WHEREAS, the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education, the
 Department of Education, and the Department of Children and Family Services have worked
 diligently and collaboratively to implement the provisions of Act No. 3 of the 2012 Regular
 Session of the Legislature, including the integration of standards and expectations across
 publicly-funded early childhood care and education programs and the support of regional
 pilot programs; and

WHEREAS, the implementation of Act No. 3 of the 2012 Regular Session of the
Legislature has appropriately focused on increasing the quality of care and education,
preparing children to be kindergarten-ready, and honoring family choices; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that all publicly-funded early childhood care and education programs offer a consistent level of quality care and education to families, providing a safe, nurturing environment for children and preparing all students to successfully enter kindergarten; and

WHEREAS, the provision of quality care and education is determined, in large part,
by the ability of early learning centers to employ capable individuals as caregivers and
teachers; and

WHEREAS, publicly-funded early childhood care and education programs in
Louisiana are not currently funded equitably, contributing to the inability of some early
learning centers and programs to meet the state's quality standards and expectations that lead
to children being kindergarten-ready; and

WHEREAS, the families of approximately 65,000 Louisiana children have expressed
their desire and need for quality early childhood care and education, as evidenced by
program enrollments and waiting lists; and

WHEREAS, the state should make every reasonable attempt to equitably fund family
choices to the fullest extent possible and to offer choices of consistent quality as families
select publicly-funded early childhood care and education.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby urge and request the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education to develop and recommend a statewide funding model for the equitable funding and distribution of public funds to support quality early childhood care and education for Louisiana families of

- 1 children, ages birth to five, requesting such services, no later than sixty days prior to the
- 2 convening of the 2015 Regular Session of the Legislature.
- 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in developing such a model, the board shall

4 consult with the state's Early Childhood Advisory Council and the leadership of

- 5 organizations representing child care, Head Start, public and non-public schools.
- 6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to the

7 president of the State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education and the state

8 superintendent of education.
