CRIME: Provides with respect to Medicaid fraud

1 AN ACT

2 To enact R.S. 14:70.1(D) and (E), relative to the crime of Medicaid fraud; to provide
3 definitions; to provide with respect to the determination of prior convictions; and to
4 provide for related matters.

5 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

6 Section 1. R.S. 14:70.1(D) and (E) are hereby enacted to read as follows:

7 §70.1. Medicaid fraud

8 * * *

9 D. For the purposes of this Section, "person" means a natural or juridical
10 person, including but not limited to a sole proprietorship, corporation, company,
11 limited liability company, partnership, limited liability partnership, trust,
12 incorporated or unincorporated association, or any other individual or entity.

13 E. For purposes of determining whether an offender has a prior conviction
14 for a violation of this Section, a conviction under this Section, or a conviction under
15 the laws of any state or federal law which is equivalent to the offenses provided for
16 in this Section, shall constitute a prior conviction.

Abstract: Regarding the crime of Medicaid fraud, provides for the definition of "person" and provides for the determination of prior convictions.

Present law provides for the crime of Medicaid fraud, punishable by imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for not more than five years, a fine of up to \$20,000, or both.

Proposed law defines "person" for the purposes of Medicaid fraud to include a natural or juridical person, including but not limited to a sole proprietorship, corporation, company, limited liability company, partnership, limited liability partnership, trust, incorporated or unincorporated association, or any other individual or entity.

Proposed law provides that a prior conviction can include a conviction from an equivalent state or federal conviction.
