2	To appropriate funds to defray the expenses of the Louisiana Judiciary, including the
3	Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, District Courts, Criminal District Court of Orleans
4	Parish, and other courts; and to provide for related matters.
5	Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
6	Section 1.A. The sum of One Hundred Eighty-Seven Million Three Hundred Ninety-
7	Four Thousand Three Hundred Sixty-Nine No/100 (\$187,394,369.00) Dollars, or so much
8	thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of the judiciary,
9	including the Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, the District Courts, the Criminal District
10	Court of Orleans Parish, and of the other courts.
11	B. The total amount herein appropriated is hereby allocated to provide as follows:

It may establish procedural and administrative rules not in conflict with law and may assign a sitting or retired judge to any court. The Supreme Court has sole authority to provide by rule for appointments of attorneys as temporary or ad hoc judges. It considers applications for writs to review individual cases, and has criminal and other appellate jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has exclusive original jurisdiction of disciplinary proceedings against lawyers, recommendations of the Judiciary Commission of Louisiana for the discipline of judges, and fact questions affecting its appellate jurisdiction. It has inherent authority to regulate the legal profession and to promulgate and update the Code of Judicial Conduct. The court also provides judicial training through the Judicial College and works to improve the administration of justice.

Program Description: The Judicial Administrator's Office assists the Supreme Court in the administration of the state court system. It staffs the Judicial Council and the Judiciary Commission of Louisiana. Through the Judicial Council, it performs studies and makes recommendations for the creation of new judgeships and for improving the administration of justice. The Judicial Administrator's Office provides payroll and other fiscal services to the Judiciary, including the administration of a judicial retirement system; support for the Supreme Court and Appellate Court human resource system; technological services to courts; and, manages the Trial Court Case Management Information System. The Judicial Administrator's Office also manages the ad hoc judgeship system, monitors cases under advisement, provides outreach services to state and local courts, staffs the Committee on Judicial Ethics, and performs numerous legal services for the Supreme Court and the Judiciary.

Program Description: As recommended by the Task Force on Legal representation in Child Protection Cases and at the request of the Division of Administration, in order to advance the administration of justice, the Supreme Court administers funding to provide qualified legal representation for children in child protection cases as required to fulfill the state's statutory responsibility.

9 TOTAL NON-JUDICIAL STATE EXPENSES

Section 2. The appropriations, and the allocations of such appropriations, from the State
General Fund (Direct) contained in Section 1 of this Act shall be reduced by a total amount
of Sixteen Million Two Hundred Twenty Nine Thousand Six Hundred Fifty and No/100
(\$16,229,650.00) Dollars, pursuant to a plan adopted by the Judicial Budgetary Control
Board or as approved by the Louisiana Supreme Court.

Section 3.A. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, or her duly authorized and appointed agent, shall warrant the state treasurer for the allocations herein provided, or for so much thereof as may be necessary. The aforesaid warrant shall be paid out of the state general fund, and the state treasurer shall pay said warrant by preference over all other warrants, except warrants for the salaries of constitutional officers of the state and warrants for expenses of the legislature, which shall be concurrent with the warrant provided by this Act.

B. The funds drawn as provided herein shall be deposited in the name of the judiciary
in an approved bank that has been selected by the Supreme Court and is located in the state.
C. Any funds herein allocated to the judiciary, any portion of the funds previously
appropriated to the judiciary, other revenue of the judiciary or its agencies, and interest
earnings are hereby appropriated and may be used to defray the expenses of the judiciary;
however, all funds remaining unexpended or unencumbered shall be returnable to the state
general fund on or before September 1, 2018.

D. For Fiscal Year 2017-2018, any surpluses occurring in the appropriations made in this Act may be transferred from one agency or line-item to another during the fiscal year in accordance with the rules of the Judicial Budgetary Control Board, or as approved by the Supreme Court.

E. The adjustment to be made in the salaries of judicial employees and the number of
 authorized positions of the judiciary shall be as decided by the judicial agency affected,
 subject to the approval of the Judicial Budgetary Control Board or as approved by the
 Supreme Court.

5 F. The program descriptions, general performance information and indicators, 6 objectives, goals, and mission statements contained in this Act are not part of the law and 7 are not enacted into law by virtue of their inclusion in this Act. The missions, goals, and 8 objectives contained in the Act are derived from performance standards established by 9 Section 10 of Part G General Administrative Rules of the Supreme Court of Louisiana.

10 G. The inclusion in this Act of staff salaries and benefits for lower court or other judicial 11 branch agency employees shall not be deemed to create or impose any obligation upon the 12 State of Louisiana Judicial Branch, the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the Judicial Budgetary 13 Control Board, or the Supreme Court Judicial Administrator's Office relative to the 14 administration of pay, retirement or other benefits to any such employees. Accordingly, the 15 State of Louisiana Judicial Branch, the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the Judicial Budgetary 16 Control Board, and the Supreme Court Judicial Administrator's Office are not to be 17 considered the "employer" or "employing agency" of lower court or other judicial agency 18 employees whose staff salaries and other benefits are included in this Act.

Section 4. This Act shall become effective on July 1, 2017; if vetoed by the
 governor and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become effective on
 July 1, 2017, or on the day following such approval by the legislature, whichever is later.
