SCHOOLS. Requires that all softball and baseball dugouts used for high school interscholastic athletics be enclosed. (8/1/18)

AN ACT

To enact R.S. 17:176(G), relative to interscholastic athletics; to require that the dugout area of any baseball or softball field used for high school interscholastic athletics be enclosed; and to provide for related matters.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

Section 1. R.S. 17:176(G) is hereby enacted to read as follows:

§176. Extracurricular activities; interscholastic athletics; participation; standards; prohibitions; filming or videotaping; definitions

\* \* \*

**G. Not later than October 1, 2018, the dugout area of any baseball or softball field that is used for high school interscholastic athletics by any public school or nonpublic school that receives public funds shall be enclosed. The enclosure shall be designed in a manner to prevent a batted or thrown ball from entering the dugout from the field of play.**

Section 2. This Act shall be known and may be cited as the "Angelle Trahan Act".

Proposed law requires that by October 1, 2018, the dugout area of any baseball or softball field that is used for high school interscholastic athletics by any public school or nonpublic school that receives public funds be enclosed and designed in a manner to keep batted or thrown balls from entering the dugout from the field of play.

Proposed law provides the Act shall be known as the "Angelle Trahan Act".

Effective August 1, 2018.

Summary of Amendments Adopted by SenateCommittee Amendments Proposed by Senate Committee on Education to the original bill

1. Provides that the dugout areas must be enclosed by no later than October 1, 2018.
2. Names the Act the "Angelle Trahan Act".
