TOPS: Creates a new Taylor Opportunity Program for Students (TOPS) award, the TOPS Transfer Award, and raises grade point average and ACT score required for initial eligibility for a TOPS Opportunity Award


#### Abstract

AN ACT

To amend and reenact R.S. 17:5002(A)(1), (D)(1)(introductory paragraph) and (2), (E), and $(\mathrm{G})(1), 5024(\mathrm{~A})$ and (B), 5025(introductory paragraph), $5027(\mathrm{~A})(1)$ and (C)(introductory paragraph), 5029(C)(introductory paragraph), and 5041(introductory paragraph), (3), (4), and (5), to enact R.S. 17:5002.1, 5024.1, 5041(6), and 5041.1, and to repeal R.S. 17:5024(C), relative to the Taylor Opportunity Program for Students; to revise certain academic criteria for initial and continuing eligibility for certain program awards; to provide for the establishment of a new program award and for amounts, duration, and eligibility requirements relative to such award; and to provide for related matters.


Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:
Section 1. R.S. 17:5002(A)(1), (D)(1)(introductory paragraph) and (2), (E), and $(\mathrm{G})(1), 5024(\mathrm{~A})$ and (B), 5025(introductory paragraph), 5027(A)(1) and (C)(introductory paragraph), 5029(C)(introductory paragraph), and 5041(introductory paragraph), (3), (4), and (5) are hereby amended and reenacted and R.S. 17:5002.1, 5024.1, 5041(6), and 5041.1 are hereby enacted to read as follows:
§5002. Awards and amounts
A.(1) A student shall be eligible for an Opportunity, Performance, Honors, or TOPS-Tech, or TOPS Transfer Award based on his academic achievement.

D.(1) Except as otherwise provided in this Subsection, a $\underline{A}$ student who is eligible for a TOPS-Tech Award pursuant to this Chapter and who is enrolled:
(2) A student who graduatect prior to the 2016-2017 sehool year, who is eligible for a TOPS-Feeh Award pursuant to this Chapter, and who is enrolled.
(a) In an eligible college or university that does not offer an aeademie undergraduate degree at the bacealatreate level, shall be awarded by the state ant amount determined by the administering ageney to equal the tuition eharged by the eollege or university during the 2016-2017 academic year.
(b) In an eligible college or university other than as provided for int Subparagraph (a) of this Paragraph, shall be awarded by the state an amount determine by the administering ageney to equal the weighted average of the tuition amounts eharged to students attending an eligible public college or university that toes not offer an aeademic undergraduate degree at the baecalatreate level during the 2016-2017 aeademic year. A student who is eligible for a TOPS Transfer Award pursuant to this Chapter and has:
(a) Enrolled in a program at an eligible college or university for which an eligible student may use a TOPS-Tech Award as provided in Paragraph (1) of this Subsection shall be awarded by the state an amount at the TOPS-Tech Award level.
(b) Subsequently enrolled in a program at an eligible college or university for which an eligible student may use an Opportunity Award as provided in Paragraphs (B)(1), (2), and (4) of this Section shall be awarded by the state an amount at the Opportunity Award level.
E.(1) No student shall be eligible for tuition payment pursuant to this Section for the Opportunity Award, the Performance Award, or the Honors Award for more than eight semesters or an equivalent number of units in an eligible institution which operates on a schedule based on units other than semesters, unless an extension is granted by the administering ageney in aceordanee with its rules.

(2) No student shall be eligible for tuition payment pursuant to this Section for the TOPS-Tech Award for more than two years unless an extension is granted by the administering ageney in aceordanee with its rules.
(3)(a) No student shall be eligible for tuition payment pursuant to Subparagraph (D)(2)(a) of this Section for the TOPS Transfer Award for more than two years.
(b) No student shall be eligible for tuition payment pursuant to Subparagraph (D)(2)(b) of this Section for the TOPS Transfer Award for more than four semesters or an equivalent number of units in an eligible institution that operates on a schedule based on units other than semesters.
(4) The administering agency may grant extensions to the time limitations provided by this Subsection in accordance with rules it adopts.
(3)(a)(5)(a) Any student receiving an a TOPS Transfer, Opportunity, Performance, or Honors Award who successfully completes an academic undergraduate degree in less than the eight semesters or its equivalent of award benefits provided by this Subsection shall be eligible to continue to receive all applicable award benefits, in accordance with the limitations as specified in Subparagraph (b) of this Paragraph, for any remaining semester or semesters or the equivalent thereof of eligibility not used to obtain the undergraduate degree if the student pursues a postgraduate academic degree at an eligible institution and the student continues to meet all academic and other requirements provided by this Section and by rule of the administering agency for continued receipt of the award as an undergraduate except as such requirements, including requirements provided by this Section for undergraduate students, may be modified by the administering agency as necessary to apply such requirements to postgraduate study.
(b) In developing rules to implement this Paragraph, the administering agency shall establish reasonable time lines and deadlines for receipt of any information required to implement this Paragraph both for current and subsequent students receiving Opportunity, Performanee, or Honors such awards and for any
student previously receiving such an award who successfully completed an academic undergraduate degree in less than eight semesters. Such rules shall also provide for appropriate notice to all such students of the time lines, deadlines, and rules governing implementation of this Paragraph.
(c) The amount of the award benefits as provided for in Subparagraph (a) of this Paragraph shall not exceed the amounts determined by the administering agency to equal the tuition charged for the postgraduate study or for undergraduate full-time enrollment charged by the highest cost public college university in the state, whichever amount is less.


#### Abstract

G. In lieu of the payment of tuition as provided in this Section, any student participating in the program provided by R.S. 29:36.1 for persons serving in the Louisiana National Guard shall receive the tuition exemption as provided therein. In addition to any other payments provided for by R.S. 29:36.1: (1) For any student who also meets the qualifications provided in this Section for receipt of an Opportunity Award, or a TOPS-Tech Award, or a TOPS Transfer Award, the state shall pay on behalf of such student a sum of three hundred dollars per semester or six hundred dollars per academic year to be applied toward the cost of books and other instructional materials.


§5002.1. Awards and amounts; exceptions
A. Notwithstanding R.S. 17:5002, a student who graduated prior to the $\underline{2016-2017}$ school year, who is eligible for a TOPS-Tech Award pursuant to this Chapter, and who is enrolled:

For such courses, five quality points shall be assigned to a letter grade of "A", four quality points shall be assigned to a letter grade of "B", three quality points shall be assigned to a letter grade of " C ", two quality points shall be assigned to a letter grade of " D ", and zero quality points shall be assigned to a letter grade of " $F$ ".
(b) The provisions of Subparagraph (a) of this Paragraph do not apply to students who graduated prion to the 2017-2018 sehool year.
B.(1) Exeept as otherwise provided by this Subseetion, a $\underline{A}$ student shall earn the following minimum test scores for the respective awards:
(a)(1) For an Opportunity Award, a composite score on the 1990 version of the ACT whieh is at least equal to or higher than the state's average composite seore, truneated to a whole number, reported for the prior year but never less than twenty of at least twenty-one or an equivalent concordant value on an enhanced or revised version of such test or on the SAT.
(b)(2) For a Performance Award, a composite score on the 1990 version of the ACT of twenty-three or higher or an equivalent concordant value on any enhanced or revised version of such test or on the SAT.
(c)(3) For an Honors Award, a score of twenty-seven or higher on the 1990 version of the ACT or an equivalent concordant value on any enhanced or revised version of such test or on the SAT.
(d)(4) For a TOPS-Tech Award, a composite score on the specified ACT of seventeen or higher or an equivalent concordant value on any enhanced or revised version of such test or on the SAT. The student may, as an alternative requirement, have attained a silver level score on the assessments of the ACT WorkKeys system.
(5) For a TOPS-Tech Transfer Award, a composite score on the 1990 version of the ACT which is at least equal to or higher than the state's average composite score, rounded to the nearest whole number, reported for the prior year but never less than twenty or an equivalent concordant value on an enhanced or revised version of such test or on the SAT.
(2)(a) For a student who graduated prior to the 2010-2011 sehool year, the ACT WorkKeys system is not an alternative assessment for establishing eligibility for a TOPS-Teeh Award.
(b) For a student who graduated prior to the 2000-2001 sehool year, the minimum ACT seore for a TOPS-Teeh Award is nimeteen.
§5024.1. Academic requirements; exceptions
A. Exceptions to R.S. 17:5024(A), academic eligibility requirements pertaining to a student's grade point average, are as follows:
(1) For an Opportunity Award, a student who graduates from high school prior to the 2021-2022 school year shall have a minimum grade point average of 2.50, calculated on a 4.00 scale using only the grades obtained by the student in completing the core curriculum requirements established by this Chapter.
(2) For a Performance Award or an Honors Award, a student shall meet the following minimum grade point average requirement, calculated on a 4.00 scale using only the grades obtained by the student in completing the core curriculum requirements established by this Chapter:
(a) For a student graduating during or after the 2007-2008 school year and prior to the 2020-2021 school year, a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.00 .
(b) For a student graduating prior to the 2007-2008 school year, a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.50 .
(3) The provisions of R.S. 17:5024(A)(2) do not apply to students graduating prior to the 2017-2018 school year.
(4) For a student who graduated prior to the 2002-2003 school year, the minimum cumulative grade point average shall be calculated by using the grades obtained by the student in completing all classes taken.
B. Exceptions to R.S. 17:5024(B), academic requirements pertaining to a student's ACT score, are as follows:
(1) For an Opportunity Award, a student graduating from high school prior to the 2021-2022 school year shall earn a composite score on the 1990 version of the $\underline{\text { ACT which is at least equal to or higher than the state's average composite score, }}$ rounded to the nearest whole number, reported for the prior year but never less than twenty or an equivalent concordant value on an enhanced or revised version of such test or on the SAT.

(2) For a student who graduated prior to the 2010-2011 school year, the ACT WorkKeys system is not an alternative assessment for establishing eligibility for a TOPS-Tech Award.
(3) For a student who graduated prior to the 2000-2001 school year, the minimum ACT score for a TOPS-Tech Award is nineteen.
C. Notwithstanding R.S. 17:5024, a student who graduated after the 20022003 school year but prior to the 2006-2007 school year is eligible to receive a Performance Award pursuant to this Chapter if he meets the other requirements of this Chapter and each of the following conditions is met:
(1) The student achieved a minimum cumulative high school grade point average of 3.00 on a 4.00 scale when calculated in accordance with applicable rules adopted by the administering agency and such calculation is based on ten or more of the grades being grades for completion of honors curriculum courses, gifted curriculum courses, or Advanced Placement courses, or any combination of such courses, and the high school awards grades for such courses on a 4.00 scale or higher.
(2) The student has a composite score on the 1990 version of the ACT of twenty-four or higher or an equivalent concordant value on any enhanced or revised version of such test or on the SAT.
§5025. High school core curriculum requirements; Opportunity, Performance,
Honors, and TOPS Transfer Awards
To be eligible for an Opportunity, Performance, or Honors Award pursuant to this Chapter, a student who graduates during or after the 2017-2018 school year shall have successfully completed a core curriculum which consists of nineteen units of high school course work, and to be eligible for a TOPS Transfer Award pursuant to this Chapter, a student who graduates during or after the 2021-2022 school year shall have successfully completed the same core curriculum, as follows:

(b) However, if at any time an otherwise eligible student receiving a Performance Award or an Honors Award in accordance with the provisions of this Chapter fails to have a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.00 on a 4.00 scale at the end of any academic year but has and continues to maintain a cumulative grade point average at least equal to that required by Paragraph (3) of this Subsection for continued participation by a recipient of an Opportunity Award, the student receiving a Performance Award or an Honors Award shall remain eligible for state payments but only in the amount provided for in R.S. 17:5002(B) for a recipient of an Opportunity Award. Notwithstanding R.S. 17:5041(3), to maintain continued state payment of any amount pursuant to an Opportunity Award pursuant to this Chapter once enrolled in college, a student who graduated from high school prior to the 2017-2018 school year shall have a cumulative grade point average of the following as evaluated at the end of each academic year:
(1) At least 2.30 calculated on a 4.00 scale after completion of twenty-four hours of credit.
(2) At least 2.50 calculated on a 4.00 scale after completion of forty-eight hours of credit. Section 2. R.S. 17:5024(C) is hereby repealed in its entirety.

#### Abstract

Creates a new Taylor Opportunity Program for Students (TOPS) award, the TOPS Transfer Award, available for two years at the TOPS-Tech Award level and two years at the Opportunity Award level, and raises GPA and ACT score required for initial eligibility for an Opportunity Award.

\section*{Taylor Opportunity Program for Students (TOPS), Generally}

Present law provides for the Taylor Opportunity Program for Students (TOPS) as a program of merit scholarships for students attending certain postsecondary education institutions who meet specific grade point average, ACT score, and core curriculum requirements and certain other qualifications. Provides for Opportunity, Performance, and Honors Awards (eight semesters) and TOPS-Tech Awards (two years).


## Establishment of a New TOPS Award

Proposed law creates a new TOPS award, the TOPS Transfer Award. Provides that a student who receives this award shall receive the equivalent of a TOPS-Tech Award for his first two years of postsecondary education and, if he meets certain criteria, the equivalent of an Opportunity Award for his remaining four semesters. Provides that the first cohort of

students eligible for such an award shall be those graduating from high school in the 20212022 school year (in other words, students entering high school in the fall of 2018).

Proposed law retains present law and provides that a student qualifying for a TOPS Transfer Award who enrolls in a program for which a student may use a TOPS-Tech Award shall receive an award amount at the TOPS-Tech Award level.

Present law provides as follows relative to the amount awarded to recipients of Opportunity, Performance, or Honors awards:

Proposed law retains present law and adds that upon enrolling in a program for which a student may use an Opportunity Award, the recipient of a TOPS Transfer Award shall receive an award amount at the Opportunity Award level.

Present law allows a student receiving an Opportunity, Performance, or Honors Award who graduates in less than eight semesters to continue to receive award benefits to pursue a postgraduate academic degree, subject to certain limitations and requirements. Proposed law grants this same opportunity to recipients of a TOPS Transfer Award.

Present law provides for a tuition exemption for persons serving in the La. National Guard and provides that in lieu of payment of tuition through a TOPS Award, they shall receive this

tuition exemption; also grants them a stipend based on whether they qualify for an Opportunity or TOPS-Tech Award ( $\$ 300$ per semester/ $\$ 600$ per academic year) or a Performance or Honors Award ( $\$ 700$ per semester $/ \$ 1400$ per academic year). Proposed law grants such persons who qualify for the TOPS Transfer Award the same stipend granted to those who qualify for an Opportunity or TOPS-Tech Award.

## Initial Eligibility Requirements

All proposed law revisions to initial eligibility requirements are applicable to students graduating from high school during or after the 2021-2022 school year (those entering high school in the fall of 2018).

ACT:
Present law requires that for an Opportunity Award, a student must attain an ACT score that is at least equal to the state's average score but never less than 20. Proposed law instead applies this ACT score requirement to the TOPS Transfer Award and raises the minimum score for an Opportunity Award to 21.

Present law requires at least a 23 for the Performance Award, at least a 27 for the Honors Award, and at least a 17 for the TOPS-Tech Award. Proposed law retains present law.

Grade point average (GPA):
Present law requires a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.50 for a TOPS-Tech or Opportunity Award and a 3.00 for a Performance or Honors Award. Increases, effective with students graduating from high school in the 2020-2021 school year, the minimum GPA for initial eligibility for a Performance Award from 3.00 to 3.25 and for an Honors Award from 3.00 to 3.50 . Proposed law raises the minimum GPA for the Opportunity Award from 2.50 to 2.75 and otherwise retains present law.

Core curriculum:

Present law provides one set of core curriculum requirements for Opportunity, Performance, and Honors Awards and another for the TOPS-Tech Award. Proposed law requires TOPS Transfer Award recipients to meet the core curriculum requirements applicable to Opportunity, Performance, and Honors Award recipients.

## Postsecondary Education Institution Enrollment

Present law provides that to be eligible for any TOPS Award, a student shall enroll in an eligible college or university as a first-time freshman not later than the semester, excluding summer semesters or sessions, immediately following the first anniversary of his high school graduation.

Proposed law applies this deadline to those qualifying for a TOPS Transfer Award and further provides that in order for such award to continue upon his completion of skill or occupational training, he shall enroll in a program at an eligible college or university not later than the semester, excluding summer semesters or sessions, immediately following the first anniversary of the date that he graduated from his preceding institution.

## Maintaining Eligibility

Present law provides general requirements for maintaining eligibility for all TOPS Awards. Requires maintaining a minimum GPA. For students qualifying for an Opportunity Award, present law requires a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.30 after 24 credit hours and 2.50 after 48 credit hours. Proposed law, applicable to students graduating from high school during or after the 2017-2018 school year, increases these minimum GPA requirements from 2.30
to 2.50 and from 2.50 to 2.75 , respectively. Also specifies that for a TOPS Transfer Award, a student must have at least a 2.75 after two years in order for his award to continue upon subsequent enrollment.

Summary of Amendments Adopted by House
The Committee Amendments Proposed by House Committee on Education to the original bill:

1. Apply provision raising minimum GPA to maintain eligibility for an Opportunity Award once enrolled in college to students entering college in the fall of 2018 instead of those entering high school in the fall of 2018.
2. Add minimum ACT score for initial eligibility for TOPS Transfer Award (state average but never less than 20 , which is the present law requirement for Opportunity Award).
