APPROPRIATIONS: Appropriates funds for the expenses of the judiciary for Fiscal Year 2021-2022

1 AN ACT 2 To appropriate funds to defray the expenses of the Louisiana Judiciary, including the 3 Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, District Courts, Criminal District Court of Orleans 4 Parish, and other courts; to provide for an effective date; and to provide for related 5 matters. 6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: 7 Section 1.A. The sum of One-Hundred Ninety Million, Seven Hundred Sixty-Eight 8 Thousand, Three Hundred Sixty-Nine and No/100 (\$190,768,369.00) Dollars, or so much 9 thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of the judiciary, 10 including the Supreme Court, Courts of Appeal, the District Courts, the Criminal District Court of Orleans Parish, and of the other courts. 11 12 B. The total amount herein appropriated is hereby allocated to provide as follows: 13 03-8170 SUPREME COURT 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 **Program Description:** The Supreme Court has general supervisory jurisdiction over all lower courts. It may establish procedural and administrative rules not in conflict with law and may assign a sitting or retired judge to any court. The Supreme Court has sole authority to provide by rule for appointments of attorneys as temporary or ad hoc judges. It considers applications for writs to review individual cases, and has criminal and other appellate jurisdiction. The Supreme Court has exclusive original jurisdiction of disciplinary proceedings against lawyers, recommendations of the Judiciary Commission of Louisiana for the discipline of judges, and fact questions affecting its appellate jurisdiction. It has inherent authority to regulate the legal profession and to promulgate and update the Code of Judicial Conduct. 1 no/100 (\$9,626,155) Dollars, pursuant to a plan adopted by the Judicial Budgetary Control 2 Board or as approved by the Louisiana Supreme Court. 3 Section 3.A. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, or his duly authorized and 4 appointed agent, shall warrant the state treasurer for the allocations herein provided, or for 5 so much thereof as may be necessary. The aforesaid warrant shall be paid out of the State 6 General Fund, and the state treasurer shall pay said warrant by preference over all other 7 warrants, except warrants for the salaries of constitutional officers of the state and warrants 8 for expenses of the legislature, which shall be concurrent with the warrant provided by this 9 Act. 10 B. The funds drawn as provided herein shall be deposited in the name of the 11 judiciary in an approved bank that has been selected by the Supreme Court and is located in 12 the state. 13 C. Any funds herein allocated to the judiciary, any portion of the funds previously 14 appropriated to the judiciary, other revenue of the judiciary or its agencies, and interest 15 earnings are hereby appropriated and may be used to defray the expenses of the judiciary; 16 however, all funds remaining unexpended or unencumbered shall be returnable to the State 17 General Fund on or before September 1, 2022. 18 D. For Fiscal Year 2021-2022, any surpluses occurring in the appropriations made 19 in this Act may be transferred from one agency or line-item to another during the fiscal year 20 in accordance with the rules of the Judicial Budgetary Control Board, or as approved by the 21 Supreme Court. 22 E. The adjustment to be made in the salaries of judicial employees and the number 23 of authorized positions of the judiciary shall be as decided by the judicial agency affected, 24 subject to the approval of the Judicial Budgetary Control Board, or as approved by the 25 Supreme Court. 26 F. The program descriptions contained in this Act are not part of the law and are not 27 enacted into law by virtue of their inclusion in this Act. 28 G. The inclusion in this Act of staff salaries and benefits for lower court or other 29 judicial branch agency employees shall not be deemed to create or impose any obligation 30 upon the State of Louisiana Judicial Branch, the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the Judicial 1 Budgetary Control Board, or the Supreme Court Judicial Administrator's Office relative to

- 2 the administration of pay, retirement, or other benefits to any such employees. Accordingly,
- 3 the State of Louisiana Judicial Branch, the Supreme Court of Louisiana, the Judicial
- 4 Budgetary Control Board, and the Supreme Court Judicial Administrator's Office are not to
- 5 be considered the "employer" or "employing agency" of lower court or other judicial agency
- 6 employees whose staff salaries and other benefits are included in this Act.
- 7 Section 4. This Act shall become effective on July 1, 2021; if vetoed by the
- 8 governor and subsequently approved by the legislature, this Act shall become effective on
- 9 July 1, 2021, or on the day following such approval by the legislature, whichever is later.

Abstract: Appropriates funds for FY 2021-2022 for expenses of the Louisiana Judiciary, including the supreme court, courts of appeal, district courts, Criminal Court of Orleans Parish, juvenile and family courts, and other courts.

Appropriates funds for Fiscal Year 2021-2022 for the ordinary operating expenses of the judicial branch of government with total funding of \$190,768,369 from the following sources: \$171,134,594 out of the State General Fund (Direct); \$9,392,850 out of Interagency Transfers; and \$10,240,925 from statutory dedications out of the Judges' Supplemental Compensation Fund and the Trial Court Case Management Fund. Appropriations from State General Fund (Direct) shall be reduced by \$9,626,155 pursuant to a plan adopted by the Judicial Budgetary Control Board or as approved by the La. Supreme Court.
