TRANSPORTATION DEPT: Provides for \$100,000 death benefit for an employee of the Department of Transportation and Development who is killed in a hazardous situation in the course and scope of his employment

Synopsis of Senate Amendments

1. Makes a technical change.

Digest of Bill as Finally Passed by Senate

<u>Proposed law</u> establishes as public policy of the Dept. of Transportation and Development (DOTD) the provision of financial security to the families of deceased DOTD workers who suffer death as a result of any injury arising out of a hazardous situation, while in the course and scope of employment.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires the payment of \$100,000 in death benefits to the surviving spouse of a DOTD worker who suffers death as a result of any injury arising out of a hazardous situation, while in the course and scope of employment.

<u>Proposed law</u> specifies that in absence of a surviving spouse, the child or children of a DOTD worker who suffers death as a result of any injury arising out of a hazardous situation, while in the course and scope of employment, and the death is not the result of an intentional act will be paid \$100,000 in death benefits.

<u>Proposed law</u> specifies that in absence of a surviving spouse or children, the named beneficiary of a DOTD worker who suffers death as a result of any injury arising out of a hazardous situation, while in the course and scope of employment, will be paid \$100,000 in death benefits.

<u>Proposed law</u> specifies that in absence of a surviving spouse, children, or a named beneficiary, the estate of a DOTD worker who suffers death as a result of any injury arising out of a hazardous situation, while in the course and scope of employment, will be paid \$100,000 in death benefits.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires that the \$100,000 death benefit payment be paid out of the Transportation Trust Fund. Requires that all recipients of the death benefit waive all rights to sue the department.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires the department promulgate rules as necessary to implement provisions of <u>proposed law</u>.

Effective upon signature of the governor or lapse of time for gubernatorial action.
