STUDENTS: Provides relative to literacy instruction and reading support services for certain students in grades six through 12

AN ACT

2 To enact R.S. 17:182, relative to literacy instruction; to provide for a literacy initiative for 3 public school students in grades six through twelve; to provide for funding; to 4 provide for requirements of the state Department of Education; and to provide for 5 related matters. 6 Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana: 7 Section 1. R.S. 17:182 is hereby enacted to read as follows: 8 §182. School literacy initiative; creation; purpose; procedures 9 A. The school literacy initiative is hereby established in an effort to provide 10 literacy instruction and reading support services to those students who are enrolled 11 in certain grade levels and are reading below grade level. 12 B. Each public school governing authority shall: 13 (1) Identify students eligible to receive literacy instruction and reading 14 support services as provided for in Subsection C of this Section. By not later than 15 September thirtieth of each year, four weeks after a student enrolls at a school, or as 16 soon as practicable if a student's reading deficiency is identified after this date, each 17 public school governing authority shall notify the parent or legal guardian of each 18 student who is eligible to receive instruction and services.

<u>(2)</u>	Establish a process whereby, before a student receives instruction and
services, his	s parent or legal guardian shall be required to enter into a memorandum
of understar	nding with the school of attendance that states that the student is receiving
assistance,	outlines the intervention plan, and states parties accountable for the
student's pr	ogress. Parents and legal guardians shall be provided an update on
student prog	gress prior to report card issuance and no later than midway through the
grading peri	iod.
(3)	Include the purposes of this Section in its Education Excellence Fund
expenditure	plan as provided for in R.S. 17:3805 or use any federal, state, or local
funds appro	opriated for the purpose of increasing literacy or supporting academic
achievemen	nt to carry out the purposes of this Section.
<u>C</u> .	A public school student, including but not limited to those in an
alternative s	school or in an alternative educational placement, who falls into both of
the following	ng categories shall be eligible to receive literacy instruction and reading
support serv	vices, in addition to his regular coursework:
<u>(1)</u>	He is enrolled in the sixth through the twelfth grade.
<u>(2)</u>	He is determined to read below grade level.
<u>D. 7</u>	The department shall:
<u>(1)</u>	Evaluate expenditure plans submitted by public school governing
authorities a	as provided for in R.S. 17:3805.
<u>(2)</u>	Evaluate providers of literacy instruction, including but not limited to
tutors and	teachers, and reading support services to determine their initial and
continued e	eligibility. The department shall establish minimum criteria by which
approved pr	oviders shall be evaluated to ensure effectiveness in improving students
reading abil	lities, including but not limited to performance on literacy assessments
approved b	by the department and, when available, the Louisiana Educational
Assessment	Program state assessment. Tutors, teachers, and other providers that fail
to demonstr	rate improvement in students' reading abilities for two consecutive years
shall ba daa	emed incligible to offer literacy instruction and reading support services

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2	that are designed to improve reading or literacy skills:
3	(a) Instructional materials and curriculum that have been reviewed in
4	accordance with R.S. 17:351.1 and have been determined to fully align with state
5	academic foundational reading skills standards. Intervention provided shall be
6	administered as teacher-led instruction along with the use of online programs and
7	materials.
8	(b) Tutoring services provided by a person who is trained in the state
9	standards for English language arts and who holds a valid teaching certificate in
10	either elementary education or reading or holds a baccalaureate or graduate degree
11	in education, English, or another subject area indicative of expertise in reading and
12	literacy. Such person shall have completed training in the foundations of literacy and
13	science of reading from a qualified provider, as determined by the department, in
14	order to be able to provide individualized and targeted instruction to students and
15	may be employed by a public school governing authority or high-quality tutoring
16	vendor as determined and approved by the department.
17	(c) Summer education programs for students in grades six through eleven.
18	(d) After-school education programs.
19	E. Each public school governing authority shall report to the department
20	relative to students' participation. The department shall submit a cumulative report
21	to the House Committee on Education and the Senate Committee on Education by
22	not later than April thirtieth of each year regarding the administration of instruction
23	and services. The report shall include, at a minimum, the following information for
24	that school year:
25	(1) The total number of students receiving literacy instruction and reading
26	support services.
27	(2) A list of the approved providers to which payments were remitted and the
28	literacy instruction and reading support services provided to each student.

Literacy instruction and reading support services shall include any of the following

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(3) A report relative to the performance of each provider and overall

performance with respect to improving participants' reading abilities.

Abstract: Provides relative to literacy services for certain public school students in 6th through 12th grade.

<u>Proposed law</u> creates opportunities for certain public school students in 6th through the 12th grade to receive literacy instruction and reading support services.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that public school students, including those at alternative schools and alternative educational settings, who are in both of the following categories are eligible:

- (1) Enrolled in the sixth through 12th grade.
- (2) Read below grade level.

Proposed law requires the state Dept. of Education to:

- (1) Develop an application process and accept applications for service providers.
- (2) Evaluate service providers for eligibility.
- (3) Annually report to the House and Senate education committees regarding services rendered.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires public school governing authorities to notify the parents or legal guardians of eligible students of the services available.

<u>Proposed law</u> requires school districts to include <u>proposed law</u> purposes in their Education Excellence Fund or to use federal, state, or local funds to carry out <u>proposed law</u>.

Summary of Amendments Adopted by House

The Committee Amendments Proposed by <u>House Committee on Education</u> to the <u>original</u> bill:

- 1. Remove eligibility requirement that students are above the average age for their grade.
- 2. Specify that students in alternative schools and alternative educational placements may be eligible students.
