3	§11. Rules and regulations by commissioner
4	* * *
5	C.(1) When the governor declares a state of emergency pursuant to R.S.
6	29:724 or a public health emergency pursuant to R.S. 29:766, the commissioner may
7	issue emergency rules or regulations that address any of the following related to
8	insurance policies or health maintenance organization contracts in this state:
9	(a) Medical coverage relative to each of the following:
10	(i) Removal of telehealth and telemedicine access restraints.

12	§1821. Payment of claims; health and accident policies; prospective review;
13	penalties; self-insurers; telemedicine telehealth reimbursement by
14	insurers; prohibitions

16	F.(1) Notwithstanding any provision of any policy or contract of insurance
17	or health benefits issued, whenever such the policy provides for payment, benefit,
18	or reimbursement for any health care healthcare service, including but not limited
19	to diagnostic testing, treatment, referral, or consultation, and such health care the
20	healthcare service is performed via transmitted electronic imaging or telemedicine,
21	<u>telehealth, such a the</u> payment, benefit, or reimbursement under such <u>the</u> policy or
22	contract shall not be denied to a licensed physician conducting or participating in the
23	transmission at the originating health care healthcare facility or terminus who is
24	physically present with the individual who is the subject of such the electronic
25	imaging transmission and is contemporaneously communicating and interacting with
26	a licensed physician at the receiving terminus of the transmission. The payment,
27	benefit, or reimbursement to such a the licensed physician at the originating facility
28	or terminus shall not be less than seventy-five percent of the reasonable and
29	customary amount of payment, benefit, or reimbursement which that licensed

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1	physician receives for an intermediate office visit.
2	(2) Any health care healthcare service proposed to be performed or
3	performed via transmitted electronic imaging or telemedicine under telehealth
4	pursuant to this Subsection shall be subject to the applicable utilization review
5	criteria and requirements of the insurer. Terminology in a health and accident
6	insurance policy or contract that either discriminates against or prohibits such a
7	method of transmitted electronic imaging or telemedicine telehealth shall be void
8	as against public policy of providing the highest quality health care to the citizens
9	of the state.

13	§1841. Definitions
14	For purposes of this Subpart, the following definitions apply:

16	(3) "Platform" means the technology, system, software, application, modality,
17	or other method through which a healthcare provider remotely interfaces with a
18	patient when providing a healthcare service or procedure as a telemedicine medical
19	service or telehealth healthcare service.

21	§1842. Telemedicine medical services and telehealth Telehealth healthcare services
22	statement
23	A.(1) Each issuer of a health coverage plan shall display in a conspicuous
24	manner on the health coverage plan issuer's website information regarding how to
25	receive covered telemedicine medical services, telehealth healthcare services, and
26	remote patient monitoring services.

28	B. This Section shall not require an issuer of a health coverage plan to display
29	negotiated contract payment rates for healthcare providers who contract with the

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1	issuer to provide telemedicine medical services or telehealth healthcare services.
2	§1843. Remote patient monitoring services
3	A. The legislature hereby finds all of the following:
4	* * *
5	(2) The goal of remote patient monitoring services provided through
6	telemedicine or telehealth is to coordinate primary, acute, behavioral, and long-term
7	social service needs for high need, high cost patients.
8	B. To receive reimbursement for the delivery of remote patient monitoring
9	services through telehealth, all of the following conditions shall be met:
10	(1) The services shall consist of all of the following:
11	(a) An assessment, problem identification, and evaluation which includes all
12	of the following:
13	* * *
14	(ii) Detection of condition changes based on the telemedicine or telehealth
15	encounter that may indicate the need for a change in the plan of care.
16	(b) Implementation of a management plan through one or more of the
17	following:
18	(i) Teaching regarding medication management as appropriate based on the
19	telemedicine or telehealth findings for that encounter.

21	(iv) Coordination of care with the ordering healthcare provider regarding the
22	telemedicine or telehealth findings.

29	B.(1) Any physician licensed or permitted by the Louisiana State Board of

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1 Medical Examiners, physician assistant when acting in accordance with their respective clinical practice guidelines, psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner, 2 3 other nurse practitioner who acts in accordance with a collaborative practice 4 agreement and receives verbal approval for executing the certificate from his collaborating physician, or psychologist may execute an emergency certificate only 5 after an actual examination of a person alleged to have a mental illness or be 6 7 suffering from a substance-related or addictive disorder who is determined to be in 8 need of immediate care and treatment in a treatment facility because the examining 9 physician, physician assistant when acting in accordance with their respective 10 clinical practice guidelines, psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner, other nurse 11 practitioner who acts in accordance with a collaborative practice agreement and 12 receives verbal approval for executing the certificate from his collaborating 13 physician, or psychologist determines the person to be dangerous to self or others or to be gravely disabled. The actual examination of the person by a psychiatrist or 14 psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner may be conducted by telemedicine 15 16 telehealth utilizing video conferencing technology provided that a licensed healthcare professional who can adequately and accurately assist with obtaining any 17 necessary information including but not limited to the information listed in 18 19 Paragraph (4) of this Subsection shall be in the examination room with the patient at the time of the video conference. A patient examined in such a manner shall be 20 21 medically cleared prior to admission to a mental health treatment facility. Failure to 22 conduct an examination prior to the execution of the certificate will be evidence of 23 gross negligence.

(4) In the case of an emergency certificate issued pursuant to an examination
conducted by telemedicine telehealth pursuant to Paragraph (1) of this Subsection
and Paragraph (J)(1) of this Section, the licensed healthcare professional present
during the actual examination shall be responsible for obtaining, recording, and
attaching to the emergency certificate the following information regarding the video

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3 F. An emergency certificate shall constitute legal authority to transport a patient to a treatment facility and shall permit the director of such treatment facility 4 to detain the patient for diagnosis and treatment for a period not to exceed fifteen 5 days, and to return the patient to the facility if he is absent with or without 6 permission during authorized periods of detention. If necessary, peace officers shall 7 8 apprehend and transport, or ambulance services, under appropriate circumstances, 9 may locate and transport, a patient on whom an emergency certificate has been 10 completed to a treatment facility at the request of either the director of the facility, 11 the certifying physician, physician assistant when acting in accordance with their 12 respective clinical practice guidelines, psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner, 13 other nurse practitioner who acts in accordance with a collaborative practice agreement and receives verbal approval for executing the certificate from his 14 collaborating physician, or psychologist, the patient's next of kin, the patient's 15 16 curator, or the agency legally responsible for his welfare. In the case of an emergency certificate issued pursuant to an examination conducted by telemedicine 17 telehealth pursuant to Paragraph (B)(1) of this Section, or where the valid original 18 19 is not provided to the transporter, a copy transmitted by facsimile or other electronic device shall be sufficient authority for the peace officer or ambulance worker to 20 transport the patient to a treatment facility and for the director to accept such patient. 21 The psychiatrist shall cause the original certificate to be deposited in the United 22 States mail properly addressed to the director of the treatment facility by the next 23 24 business day following the date of examination. The director of the treatment facility shall notify the patient's nearest relative, if known, or designated responsible party, 25 if any, in writing, of the patient's admission by emergency certificate as soon as 26 27 reasonably possible. (2) Within seventy-two hours of admission, the person shall be independently

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1	examined by the coroner or his deputy who shall execute an emergency certificate,
2	pursuant to Subsection B of this Section, which shall be a necessary precondition to
3	the person's continued confinement. Except as provided in Paragraph (7) of this
4	Subsection, if the actual examination by the psychiatrist referred to in Paragraph
5	(B)(1) of this Section is conducted by telemedicine, telehealth, the seventy-two-hour
6	independent examination by the coroner shall be conducted in person.

26	J.(1) Upon the request of a credible person of legal age who is financially
27	unable to afford a private physician or who cannot immediately obtain an
28	examination by a physician, the parish coroner may render, or the coroner or a judge
29	of a court of competent jurisdiction may cause to be rendered by a physician, an

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1	actual examination of a person alleged to have a mental illness or be suffering from
2	a substance-related or addictive disorder and in need of immediate medical treatment
3	because he is dangerous to himself or others or is gravely disabled. The actual
4	examination of the person by a psychiatrist may be conducted by telemedicine
5	telehealth utilizing video conferencing technology provided that a licensed
6	healthcare professional who can adequately and accurately assist with obtaining any
7	necessary information including but not limited to the information listed in
8	Paragraph (B)(4) of this Section shall be in the examination room with the patient
9	at the time of the video conference. If the coroner is not a physician he may deputize
10	a physician to perform this examination. To accomplish the examination authorized
11	by this Subsection, if the coroner or the judge is apprehensive that his own safety or
12	that of the deputy or other physician may be endangered thereby, he shall issue a

15	Section 3. R.S. 37:1262(4), 1271, the introductory paragraph of 1271.1(A) and
16	1271.1(A)(2) and (3), and 1285.2(D)(2) are hereby amended and reenacted to read as

18	§1262. Definition
19	As used in this Part the following words and phrases shall have the meanings
20	ascribed to them:

22	(4) "Telemedicine" means the practice of health care delivery, diagnosis,
23	consultation, treatment, and transfer of medical data by a physician using technology
24	that enables the physician and a patient at two locations separated by distance to
25	interact. Such technology may include electronic communications, information
26	technology, asynchronous store-and-forward transfer technology, or technology that
27	facilitates synchronous interaction between a physician at a distant site and a patient
28	at an originating site. The term "telemedicine" shall not include any of the following:
29	(a) Electronic mail messages and text messages that are not compliant with

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1	applicable requirements of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act
2	of 1996, as amended 42 U.S.C. 1320d et seq.
3	(b) Facsimile transmissions.
4	"Telehealth" shall have the same meaning as that term defined in R.S.
5	<u>40:1223.3.</u>

7	§1271. License to practice medicine or telemedicine required
8	A. No Except as provided in the Louisiana Telehealth Access Act, R.S.
9	40:1223.1 et seq., no person shall practice medicine as defined in this Part until he
10	possesses a duly recorded license issued pursuant to this Part, a permit or registration
11	as provided for in this Part, or a certificate issued pursuant to Part I-D of this
12	Chapter.
13	B.(1) No person shall practice or attempt to practice medicine across state
14	lines without first complying with the provisions of this Part and without being a
15	holder of either an unrestricted license to practice medicine in Louisiana or a
16	telemedicine license entitling him to practice medicine pursuant to R.S. 37:1276.1.
17	(2) Except as provided in R.S. 37:1271.1 and 1276.1, all of the following
18	shall apply to any physician practicing telemedicine as defined in this Part:
19	(a) The physician practicing telemedicine shall use the same standard of care
20	as if the healthcare services were provided in person.
21	(b) The physician practicing telemedicine shall not be required to conduct an
22	in-person patient history or physical examination of the patient before engaging in
23	a telemedicine encounter if the physician satisfies all of the following conditions:
24	(i) Holds an unrestricted license to practice medicine in Louisiana.
25	(ii) Has access to the patient's medical records upon consent of the patient.
26	(iii) Creates a medical record on each patient and makes such record available
27	to the board upon request.
28	(iv) If necessary, provides a referral to a physician in this state or arranges for
29	follow-up care in this state as may be indicated.

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1	(3) Except as authorized by R.S. 37:1271.1 or otherwise by rule promulgated
2	by the board, no physician practicing telemedicine pursuant to this Subsection shall
3	prescribe any controlled dangerous substance prior to conducting an appropriate
4	in-person patient history or physical examination of the patient as determined by the
5	board.
6	(4) (a) A patient receiving telemedicine services may be in any location at the
7	time that the telemedicine services are rendered. A physician practicing telemedicine
8	may be in any location when providing telemedicine services to a patient.
9	(b) A physician practicing telemedicine may utilize interactive audio without
10	the requirement of video if, after access and review of the patient's medical records,
11	the physician determines that he is able to meet the same standard of care as if the
12	healthcare services were provided in person.
13	(5) A physician practicing telemedicine shall document the telemedicine
14	services rendered in the patient's medical records according to the same standard as
15	that required for nontelemedicine services. Medical records including but not limited
16	to video, audio, electronic, or other records generated as a result of providing
17	telemedicine services shall be considered as confidential and shall be subject to all
18	applicable state and federal laws and regulations relative to the privacy of health
19	information.
20	(6) Venue in any suit filed involving care rendered via telemedicine shall be
21	in accordance with the provisions of R.S. 40:1223.5.
22	§1271.1. Practice of telemedicine Physician utilization of telehealth in licensed

24	A. All of the following restrictions and authorizations apply to a physician
25	who holds an unrestricted license to practice medicine from the board and who
26	practices telemedicine upon utilizes telehealth for any patient who is being treated

28	and which holds a current registration with the United States Drug Enforcement

5	Collaborative; membership; powers and duties; annual report
6	* * *
7	B. The legislature hereby establishes the Health Care Information
8	Technology and Infrastructure Collaborative to be composed of LARHIX, the Health
9	Information Technology Committee of the Louisiana Health Care Quality Forum and
10	any other current or future regional health information exchange, hereinafter referred
11	to in this Section as "collaborative." The collaborative shall advise the secretary of
12	the Louisiana Department of Health on strategies for the advancement of the use of
13	electronic health information technology through the identification of state laws and
14	regulations that impede such advancement, including but not limited to those laws
15	and regulations that concern the form of consent to medical treatment and
16	authorization for other health care transactions, and matters related to facilitation of
17	telemedicine telehealth consultations.

19	§1167.2. Legislative findings; purpose
20	The legislature finds that:
21	* * *
22	(6) In 2007, the state authorized the secretary to enter into a Cooperative
23	Endeavor Agreement ("CEA") with the Rural Hospital Coalition, Inc. (the
24	"Coalition"), for the establishment of the Louisiana Rural Health Information
25	Exchange (LARHIX), a multi-regional health care information exchange. With the
26	funding provided, seven rural hospitals acquired EHR technology and were linked
27	to Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center - Shreveport (LSUHSC-S) via
28	a state-of-the-art integration engine, permitting a panel of specialists to access a rural
29	patient's medical record in real time while consulting with the patient over the

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1	telemedicine telehealth equipment located at the rural hospital. In 2008, the state
2	entered into a five-year CEA with the Coalition and provided funding to expand the
3	network to seven additional rural hospitals. LARHIX has been honored as a network
4	model with multiple award nominations by national technology organizations.

6	§1167.4. Establishment of the Electronic Health Records Loan Program
7	* * *
8	E. The secretary is authorized to enter into CEAs to facilitate with any entity
9	access to the ARRA loan program funding and to make loans to eligible providers
10	to provide for the acquisition and implementation of certified EHR technology by
11	eligible providers, and where integrated, telemedicine telehealth technology.
12	F. To provide for the expansion and administration of LARHIX and other
13	related matters, the secretary shall enter into a CEA with the Coalition, the terms of
14	which shall govern the program's loans made available to rural hospitals, and with
15	the secretary's approval, to other rural health care providers who have elected to
16	partner with rural hospitals in the acquisition of certified EHR technology. For
17	purposes of this Subsection and to the extent permitted by the ARRA, certified EHR
18	technology will include telemedicine telehealth technology which such technology
19	is fully integrated with the certified EHR technology acquired by the hospital.

21	§1223.2. Legislative findings
22	The legislature hereby finds and declares the following:

24	(3) Telehealth services could potentially address a great unmet need for
25	health care by persons who have limited access to both traditional healthcare settings
26	and to telemedicine as currently defined in Louisiana law.

28	§1223.3. Definitions
29	As used in this Part, the following terms have the meaning ascribed in this

3	(3) "Healthcare provider" means a person, partnership, limited liability
4	partnership, limited liability company, corporation, facility, or institution licensed
5	or certified by this state to practice medicine or provide healthcare health care or
6	healthcare professional services as a physician assistant; hospital; nursing home;
7	dentist; registered nurse; advanced practice registered nurse; licensed dietitian or
8	nutritionist; licensed practical nurse; certified nurse assistant; offshore health service
9	provider; ambulance service; licensed midwife; pharmacist; speech-language
10	pathologist; audiologist; optometrist; podiatrist; chiropractor; physical therapist;
11	occupational therapist; certified or licensed athletic trainer; psychologist; medical
12	psychologist; social worker; licensed professional counselor; licensed perfusionist;
13	licensed respiratory therapist; licensed radiologic technologist; licensed hearing aid
14	dealer; licensed, certified, or registered addiction counselor; licensed, certified, or
15	registered prevention professional; certified compulsive gambling counselor;
16	behavioral health provider who works for a licensed agency or credentialed provider
17	which provides community psychiatric support and treatment services or
18	psychosocial rehabilitation services as defined in R.S. 40:2162; or licensed clinical
19	laboratory scientist which may be provided by telehealth in the ordinary course
20	of business or practice of a profession.

22	(5) "Synchronous interaction" means communication through interactive
23	technology that enables a healthcare provider and a patient at two locations separated
24	by distance to interact via two-way video and audio transmissions simultaneously.
25	The healthcare provider may utilize interactive audio without the requirement of
26	video if, after access and review of the patient's medical records, the provider
27	determines that he is able to meet the same standard of care as if the healthcare
28	services were provided in person.

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1	§1223.4. Telehealth; rulemaking required
2	A. Each state agency or professional or occupational licensing board or
3	commission that regulates the practice of a healthcare provider, as defined in this
4	Part, may shall promulgate, in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act,
5	any rules necessary to provide for, promote, and regulate the use of telehealth in the
6	delivery of healthcare services within the scope of practice regulated by the licensing
7	entity. However, any rules and regulations shall be consistent with and no more
8	restrictive than the provisions contained in this Section.
9	B. The rules shall, at a minimum, provide for all of the following:
10	* * *
11	(3)(a) Licensing or registration of out-of-state healthcare providers who seek
12	to furnish healthcare services via telehealth to persons at originating sites in
13	Louisiana. The rules shall ensure that any such the healthcare provider possesses, at
14	a minimum, an unrestricted and unencumbered license in good standing to perform
15	the healthcare service in the state in which the healthcare provider is located, and that
16	the license is comparable to its corresponding license in Louisiana as determined by
17	the respective Louisiana licensing agency, board, or commission.
18	(b) Each state agency and professional or occupational licensing board or
19	commission is authorized to may provide by rule for a reasonable fee for the license
20	or registration provided for in this Subsection.
21	* * *
22	(5) Except as otherwise provided in Paragraph (6) of this Subsection, a
23	healthcare provider shall not be required to conduct an in-person patient
24	history or physical examination of the patient before engaging in a telehealth
25	encounter but shall provide a referral to a healthcare provider in this state or
26	arrange for follow-up care in this state as necessary.

<u>Present law</u> provides for the practice of telemedicine by physicians and the practice of telehealth by all other healthcare providers. <u>Proposed law</u> repeals provisions relative to telemedicine and specifies that telehealth includes a physician's practice of medicine when conducted through electronic communications.

<u>Present law</u> authorizes each state agency or professional or occupational licensing board or commission that regulates the practice of a healthcare provider to promulgate any rules necessary to provide for, promote, and regulate the use of telehealth in the delivery of healthcare services within the scope of practice regulated by the licensing entity. <u>Proposed law</u> changes the authorization to a requirement for the state agency or professional or occupational licensing board or commission to promulgate rules for telehealth.

<u>Present law</u> provides for the minimum content of the rules to be promulgated by the regulatory state agency or professional or occupational licensing board or commission. <u>Proposed law</u> retains <u>present law</u> and adds a prohibition on any requirement for an in-person patient history or physical examination of the patient before engaging in a telehealth encounter unless the healthcare provider is prescribing a controlled dangerous substance. <u>Proposed law</u> further provides for exceptions to the requirement for an in-person patient history or physical examination when prescribing a controlled dangerous substance.

<u>Proposed law</u> makes technical changes in <u>present law</u> to update references <u>from</u> telemedicine <u>to</u> telehealth to conform with <u>proposed law</u>.
