STUDENT/ASSESSMENT: Prohibits requiring students to pass state-administered end-ofcourse (LEAP) tests in order to graduate from high school

2	To enact R.S. 17:24.4(F)(1)(g), relative to high school graduation; to provide relative to
3	requirements for graduation; to prohibit requiring students from passing end-of-
4	course assessments to be eligible for high school graduation; and to provide for
5	related matters.

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Chassion

<u>Present law</u> requires the state Dept. of Education (DOE) to implement the Louisiana Educational Assessment Program (LEAP) with the approval of the State Bd. of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE). Requires that BESE implement standards-based assessments in English language arts, math, science, and social studies and that the tests be administered, at a minimum, in grades three through 11. Also requires BESE to establish by rule the adequate test score to determine successful performance of the student on each test; <u>present administrative rule</u> (BESE policy) requires students to pass certain end-of-course assessments in order to be eligible for a high school diploma.

<u>Proposed law</u> defines eligibility for a high school diploma as successfully completing all Carnegie units required for graduation, regardless of scores on any state-administered assessments.
