CRIME/PUNISHMENT. Prohibits early termination of probation and parole for certain offenses. (8/1/24)

#### SUMMARY OF HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO THE SENATE BILL

- 1. Make technical changes.
- 2. Remove provisions relative to early termination of parole.
- 3. Relative to termination of probation or suspended sentence, move <u>proposed</u> <u>law</u> relative to vehicular negligent injuring <u>from</u> provisions of <u>present law</u> pertaining to felony cases <u>to</u> provisions of <u>present law</u> pertaining to misdemeanor cases.

<u>Present law</u> (C.Cr.P. Art. 893) provides that the court may terminate probation as "satisfactorily completed" at any time if a final determination is made that the defendant is in compliance with all other terms and conditions of his probation.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that a court will not terminate probation early if <u>proposed law</u> making certain offenses ineligible for earned compliance credits prohibits doing so.

<u>Present law</u> (C.Cr.P. Art. 897) provides that in a felony case, the court may terminate probation early, or as unsatisfactory, and discharge the defendant at any time after the expiration of one year of probation in certain circumstances.

<u>Proposed law</u> provides that the court, for a conviction of operating a vehicle while intoxicated, vehicular homicide, or first degree vehicular negligent injuring, shall not terminate probation early, or as unsatisfactory, and discharge the defendant.

<u>Present law</u> provides that in a misdemeanor case, the court may terminate the defendant's suspended sentence or probation and discharge him at any time when certain conditions are met.

<u>Proposed law</u> amends <u>present law</u> to prohibit the termination of the defendant's suspended sentence or probation if the offense is vehicular negligent injuring.

Effective August 1, 2024.
