SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 77

SPECIAL DAY/WEEK/MONTH. Recognizes June 7th as the Battle of Milliken's Bend Day in Madison Parish.

1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION
2	To recognize June 7th as the Battle of Milliken's Bend Day in Madison Parish.
3	WHEREAS, in 1863, Milliken's Bend was a small community located on the west
4	bank of the Mississippi River, approximately fifteen miles above Vicksburg, Mississippi,
5	near the border of Madison and Carroll Parishes (now East Carroll Parish); and
6	WHEREAS, the area was predominantly agricultural, with cotton and corn as the
7	primary crops, cultivated by hundreds of enslaved individuals who composed between 75%
8	and 90% of the population in this region of Louisiana; and
9	WHEREAS, on June 7, 1863, during the Civil War, Confederate cavalry launched
10	an attack on a Union encampment along the Mississippi River at Milliken's Bend under the
11	command of Colonel Hermann Lieb; and
12	WHEREAS, the Union forces included an infantry brigade of African American
13	troops, consisting of the 9th, 11th, and 13th Louisiana regiments, the 1st Mississippi
14	regiment, and the 23rd Iowa Infantry; and
15	WHEREAS, the battle of Milliken's Bend was one of the earliest engagements in the
16	Civil War where African American troops fought, with the majority of Union forces being
17	composed of black troops, many of whom were formerly enslaved and scarcely trained; and
18	WHEREAS, the African American soldiers fought with exceptional courage and

1	tenacity, setting a powerful example that was used by Union recruiters to encourage other
2	African Americans, both free and formerly enslaved, to join the United States Army; and
3	WHEREAS, the success of the African American troops had a profound impact on
4	Union and Confederate officers, demonstrating the capability and bravery of Black soldiers
5	fighting for their freedom; and
6	WHEREAS, Major General Ulysses S. Grant officially praised the African American
7	soldiers for their valor and success, leading to the enlistment of thousands more African
8	Americans into newly-formed regiments; and
9	WHEREAS, the gallantry and determination of the African American soldiers at
10	Milliken's Bend encouraged enslaved individuals to strive to attain their freedom; and
11	WHEREAS, the huge influx in infantry brigades of African American troops came
12	at a time when Confederate troop strength was rapidly decreasing due to casualties, and
13	helped to ensure total Federal victory in the Civil War; and
14	WHEREAS, by the end of the Civil War in 1865, nearly 180,000 African American
15	men served as soldiers in the United States Army, with close to 10,000 dying in battle and
16	another 30,000 succumbing to illness or infection.
17	THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of Louisiana does hereby
18	recognize June 7th as the Battle of Milliken's Bend Day in Madison Parish, acknowledges
19	the historical impact of the battle in shaping the course of the Civil War, and pays tribute to
20	the legacy of the courageous soldiers.
21	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to Alvin
22	Bagby, founder of the Madison Parish African American Association.
