HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 140

MTR VEHICLE/WEIGHT REGS: Urges and requests the members of the U.S. Congress to oppose any legislation that will allow an increase in truck weight and size

1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION
2	To urge and request members of the United States Congress to oppose any legislation
3	allowing an increase in truck weight and size.
4	WHEREAS, on February 17, 2011, House Resolution 763, the Safe Efficient
5	Transportation Act of 2011(hereinafter referred to as SETA) was introduced in the United
6	States House of Representatives in order to give any state the option to allow a vehicle
7	weighing up to 97,000 pounds access to interstate highways, provided owners equip trucks
8	with a sixth axle, the weight of any single axle does not exceed 20,000 pounds, the weight
9	of any tandem axle does not exceed 34,000 pounds, the weight of any group of three or more
10	axles does not exceed 51,000 pounds, and users agree to pay a supplemental user fee; and
11	WHEREAS, on February 18, 2011, the United States House of Representatives
12	Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure referred SETA to its Subcommittee on
13	Highways and Transit; and
14	WHEREAS, on April 6, 2011, Senate Bill 747, identical to House Resolution 763,
15	was introduced and referred to the United States Senate Committee on Finance; and
16	WHEREAS, should either of these pieces of legislation be signed into law, our aging
17	highway system will be strained in an unprecedented manner, further financially burdening
18	states and endangering the motoring public; and
19	WHEREAS, the May 2000 Addendum to the 1997 Federal Highway Cost Allocation
20	Study, Final Report, United States Department of Transportation, Federal Highway

1 Administration, reports that 80,000 pound single-trailer trucks only pay eighty percent of the 2 cost of the damage they cause; and 3 WHEREAS, the same study shows that increasing truck weights up to 97,000 pounds 4 would result in trucks only paying for about fifty percent of the damage they would do; and 5 WHEREAS, the same study reports that the federal government already subsidizes 6 heavy truck operations by almost two billion dollars every year; and 7 WHEREAS, allowing heavier and longer trucks to operate on interstate highways 8 would add new costs and increase the burden on taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, increasing the permissible truck size and weight on interstate highways would require that many bridges in the state be replaced, strengthened, or posted, all of which would impose additional costs and unfunded mandates on Louisiana's already underfunded transportation infrastructure program and ultimately each citizen of Louisiana.
