Adley (SB 60)

<u>New law</u> creates the crime of false personation of a veteran or fraudulent representation of a veteran-owned business.

<u>New law</u> defines false personation of a veteran as the false representation by a person of being a veteran, with the intent to injure, defraud, obtain economic gain, or obtain or secure any special privilege or advantage.

<u>New law</u> defines fraudulent representation of a veteran-owned business as the false representation by an owner, operator, principal, or employee of a business that the business is owned by a veteran or is a service-connected disabled veteran-owned business, with the intent to injure, defraud, obtain economic gain, or obtain or secure any special privilege or advantage.

<u>New law</u> defines "veteran" as a person who has served in the armed services or reserve forces of the United States or La. National Guard.

<u>New law</u> provides that whoever commits the crime of false personation of a veteran or fraudulent representation of a veteran-owned business is to be fined not more than \$1,000, or imprisoned for not more than six months, or both.

Effective upon signature of the governor (June 4, 2013).
